



A Morning in the Greek Agora

Behind the famous temples and philosophers, the ancient Greeks lived busy, ordinary days that still feel surprisingly close to our own.

When we think about ancient Greece, we often picture white temples, marble statues, and clever men in long robes talking about big ideas. But most Greeks were not philosophers or kings. They were farmers, sellers, and workers who woke up early and worried about food, money, and family, just as people do today.

The busiest place in any Greek city was the agora, the open market at the centre of town. Every morning it filled with noise and life. Sellers shouted about their [goods](#)¹, and buyers argued about the price of fish, olives, and cloth. People used small metal [coins](#)² to pay, and this simple system of [trade](#)³ helped the city grow rich. If you had lost a friend in the crowd, the agora was the first place you would look.

Greek houses were often small and built around a quiet open yard. Rich families owned many rooms and had servants to cook and clean, while poorer families lived in just one or two rooms. Men usually spent their days outside, working or meeting friends. Women were expected to stay at home, look after the children, and make cloth. Life for a woman was not easy, and history books have long tried to show how hard and closed her world could be.

Food was simple but fresh. Most families ate bread, cheese, olives, and vegetables, and they drank wine mixed with

water. Meat was expensive, so ordinary people ate it only on special days, often after a religious festival.

Religion touched every part of daily life. The Greeks believed in many gods, and a priest would offer gifts at the temple to keep them happy. Before a long journey or an important decision, people asked the gods for help. Nobody could [prove](#)⁴ that the gods were listening, but few people ever thought to [argue](#)⁵ against these old beliefs.

The Greeks also loved to think and talk. In cities like Athens, free men met in public to discuss how their city should be ruled. This early idea of shared power slowly grew into what we now call democracy. Public speaking was a real skill, and a good [speech](#)⁶ could change people's minds and even shape the future of the city.

Sport and theatre mattered too. Thousands of people travelled to Olympia every four years to watch the games, and huge crowds sat in open-air theatres to enjoy plays about heroes and gods.

Today, when we visit the broken columns and quiet ruins of Greece, it is easy to forget the noise. But once, these silent stones were full of ordinary people, living their ordinary and very human lives.

- Q1** Most Greeks lived normal lives and shared everyday worries with people today.

✓ Correct (B)

The writer says most Greeks 'were not philosophers or kings' but were 'farmers, sellers, and workers' who 'worried about food, money, and family, just as people do today.' This directly connects ordinary ancient life to modern life, which is the paragraph's main idea. The other options focus on small details or ideas the text does not support.

- Q2** Because meat was expensive.

✓ Correct (A)

The text states clearly: 'Meat was expensive, so ordinary people ate it only on special days.' The word 'so' shows that the high price was the reason. The other options are not mentioned and cannot be found in the passage.

- Q3** **Answer:** In ancient Greece, men and women lived quite separate lives. Men usually spent their days outside the home, working, meeting friends, and in some cities taking part in public discussions about how the city should be ruled. Women, on the other hand, were expected to stay at home, look after the children, and make cloth. The text also suggests that a woman's world was 'hard and closed', which means she had far less freedom than a man. So the main difference was that men had a public, social life, while women were mostly limited to private life inside the home.

Explanation: A strong answer should clearly contrast the public role of men (working, meeting friends, joining public discussion) with the private, domestic role of women (staying home, raising children, making cloth). It should use specific details from the text and ideally note that women had less freedom. Good answers use the learner's own words rather than copying whole sentences.

VOCABULARY — TRANSLATION & NOTES

goods

'Goods' is almost always plural and takes a plural verb: 'The goods are ready.' Common phrases include 'buy goods' and 'sell goods'.

coin

We say 'a gold/silver coin' and 'toss a coin' to make a quick decision. Do not confuse 'coin' (metal) with 'note' or 'bill' (paper money).

trade

Often used with 'with' (trade with China) and in phrases like 'free trade'. It can also be a verb: 'They trade in fruit and vegetables.'

prove

The past forms are 'proved' and 'proven'. A useful phrase is 'prove someone wrong'. Be careful: 'prove' means to show truth, not simply to 'try'.

argue

'Argue with someone' means to have a disagreement, while 'argue that...' means to give an opinion with reasons. The noun is 'argument'.

speech

We usually say 'give' or 'make a speech', not 'do a speech'. 'Speech' can also mean the general ability to speak.
